




The word "advent," from the Latin *adventus* (Greek *parousia*), means "coming" or "arrival." The **Advent Season** is focused on anticipating the arrival of Jesus as Messiah (Christ or King). The worship, scripture readings, and prayers not only prepare us spiritually for Christmas (his first coming), but also for his second coming. This is why the Scripture readings during Advent in-

clude both Old Testament passages related to the expected Messiah, and New Testament passages concerning Jesus' second coming as judge of all.

Christmas is not meant to be an isolated day, but a festival of the Incarnation in the midst of the Church year. Christmas is only properly understood after having the preparation provided by Advent. In the midst of the secular excesses leading up to Christmas, Advent provides a welcome solace and an opportunity to continually re-orient ourselves to God's will as we expectantly wait for the true meaning of Christmas: the Incarnation of God the Son.



St. James AME Church History - Historic Method - Raleigh, NC



Saint James African Methodist Episcopal Church is a Gothic Revival brick structure, which received its historical landmark status from the Raleigh Historic Districts Commission (RHDC) on September 1, 2009. The church is historically significant as an important example of the spirit of communitybuilding and individual and collective improvement, supported by African-American residents, entrepreneurs, and as the only church that still occupies its early-twentieth-century structure.

As an early settlement, the Mason Village or Masonville population grew, so did the need for a place of worship. The community was comprised of hard working people, earning wages from farming, janitorial work, construction jobs, house cleaners, and laborers at the local state college. During this Reconstruction era, people would gather at individual homes, outside, or any other available space to practice their Christian beliefs. Therefore, in 1872, a group of courageous men, Louis Atwater, Zaney Coggins, Lewis Mason, Bennett Powell, John Rhone, and Henry Wood, set their sight on a parcel of property for a holy place. Through God's blessings, the first wooden structure was erected. County records indicate that the church had been in existence six years prior to the building of the actual foundational structure, making the founding year 1866. These records also show additional land was acquired at the rear of the church in later years. It is believed that either the Norfolk Southern Railway or the United States Postal Service changed the name of Mason Village to Method around 1890.

The current edifice, built in 1923, is one of nine buildings and athletic facilities that are a part of Berry O'Kelly Historic District and School Campus. The land for the new structure had been donated by one of Method's most prominent businessmen, Berry O'Kelly. The church has architectural significance and is built of solid red brick masonry, an irregular form, a front-gable roof, and a tall tower and steeple. The building remains well-preserved and retains much of its original features on the exterior, including its pointed-arch, stained-glass



windows, doorways, and brick- framed sign. St. James served as the site where numerous Berry O'Kelly School graduation ceremonies were held, during the tenure of the school's operation. The church has a rich history, but we realize there are still some missing pieces. We know from banking documentation that a church parsonage was acquired during the early 1950s.

Several Sunday School conventions and district meetings have been held at the church. Under the pastorate of Rev. James N. Sheares and Mrs. Shirley Sheares, St. James' youth member, Sharon Taylor, won several oratorical contests. St. James was a circuit church during those years, rendering services only on the first and third Sundays. Rev. Sheares was also the overseer at Piney Grove AME on the second Sunday, and Boylan Chapel AME Church on the fourth Sunday. The Reverend Mary Frazier, A.J. Turner, J. Bernard Wilder, Whalen Hogan, and Robert Walker, all served as Associate Ministers under Rev. James N. Sheares.

The list of other circuit pastors include: Reverend Murray, Hadden, Easterling, Wallace, Dr. R. W. Wisner, David Jackson, Jasper D. Hill, Jr., J.O. Smith, J. J. Baker, B. H. Lucas, C. C. Scott, B. F. Pickett, A. J. Mattison, Sidney Williams, Josiah Davis, Joseph Hunter, S. A. Thompson, and Nathaniel Gaylord.

Sister Dora Stroud, for whom our Missionary Society is named after, invited all into the house of the Lord, whether you were a regular attendee, or not. She worked diligently to build the Men's Sunday School class and Missionary Society. Miss Dora, as she was affectionately called, was known throughout Method and the greater AME community, for sponsoring youth plays, assigning Easter speeches, organizing baby contests, mock weddings, and other rewarding dramas. Even through difficult times, Miss Dora and other willing workers joined together to provide spiritual growth and physical needs of the early church. They wanted to maintain the integrity and dedication of the early parishioners. These pioneers include, Lonnie and Beulah Atwater, Bertha Edwards, Fred and Florence Hackney, Lorena Money Hall, Ethel Banks Harris, Mary Ida Harris, Roxie Parrish Lee, Wiley and Lillie Rogers, Ida and Mary P. Thomas, Kathleen Utley, Savannah Rogers, Louise Muckle, Thomas Wilcox, Deck Mason, and Jack Hicks.

Rev. James N. Sheares departed St. James in 1972, after his appointment as a Presiding Elder of the Western North Carolina Conference of the AME Church. He left our congregation much wiser and stronger. St. James became a station church, after the closure of Boylan Chapel. As years passed, the church continued to move forward under the tutelage of Rev. William E. Diggs, Rev. Allen D. Terrell, Rev. David L. Morrison, Rev. Samuel T. Wilson, Rev. Thomas G. Weatherford, Rev. James Beard, Rev. Casimir K. Brown, Rev. Kelvin Royster, and Rev. Leodis Strong.

The Rev. J. Bernard Wilder was the only shepherd who served St. James as an Associate Pastor, Senior Pastor, and as its Presiding Elder. The church sanctuary was carpeted, new hymnals and bibles were purchased, the church parsonage was sold, and a stationary telephone line was added during his administration.

After the arrival of Rev. A.J. Holman, the church body voted to begin a building project. The congregation wanted a fellowship hall, a new Pastor Study, and separate bathrooms. The people had the mind to work, but the task was an uphill battle. The church decided not to borrow the money for the addition, but rather pay out of pocket because of bad business dealings. After countless fundraising efforts, the addition was completed under the direction of Rev. Randolph Phillip Lynch, Sr. The additional space was dedicated by Bishop Vinton R. Ander-



son, Presiding Prelate of the Second Episcopal District of the African Methodist Church on June 6, 1999. There are many family members and friends who helped to complete this venture.

St. James AME Church History ~ Continued



The history of St. James would not be complete without sharing the story of Bro. Joseph Clyde Atwater. He was a trustee, steward, and the longest serving Sunday School Superintendent in the history of the church, at over 20 years. During his 95+ years as a member, he inspired all who came in contact with him. He believed in the Proverb 22:6, "Train up a child in the way he should go: and when he is old, he will not depart from it." He and his wife, Mrs. Lula Pearl Atwater donated many items to the church, including an organ, a heating and air conditioner unit, and a kitchen suite.

The Sons of Allen auxiliary was organized under the pastorate of Rev. Harry J. Simpson. The purpose of the SOA Fellowship group is to foster closer relationships between men of the church, to equip men of the church for meaningful service, to reach unchurched men, and to present positive role models for our youth.

In May 2012, the membership welcomed Reverend Phyllis T. Royal. The congregation embraced her vision of outreach ministry and expansion of the Christian Education Department, to make it a more vital entity of the church. Pastor Royal and her husband, Dr. Erroll Royal, have sponsored several workshops for the community. Under her leadership, a website has been developed; a non-profit community alliance has been established, which includes a scholarship component. The alliance also conducted its first summer daycare program. The church sanctuary has had a facelift with new carpet, refaced padded pews, a new pulpit altar set, new roof, new steps for the entryway, painting of the fellowship hall, and re-facing of the brick exterior and church sign.

Throughout the years, the church has faced many trials, but God is our refuge and only through faith in him, we remain to serve the community. We spread the Gospel through outreach ministry at local assisted living/rehabilitation facilities, provide food security at the local shelters and the AME empowerment center, send school supplies/snacks to local classrooms, host mentoring sessions for our youth and enrichment workshops for adults, support victims of domestic violence, and give gifts for the prison angel tree ministry. May God's rich blessings continue to rein over St. James and its congregation.
