From an early age we work to get approval, whether it is proving to our parents that we can ride a bike without training wheels, or taking our first step—caring what other people think seems evitable. In leadership that does not change.

Through the years it can become a problem for us as it can cripple us emotionally and spiritually. We need to get to the point where we don't care what the media says, how colleagues feel about us, or live in state of constant fear or agony of what others think. The other person is not going to worry about it, or stay awake at night upset that you're offended. You can't be responsible for other people's words, actions, or decisions as hurtful as they can be. SOCIAL JUSTICE

With its second #SocialJusticeSunday of the summer, on Aug. 25, St. Joseph welcomed an overflow crowd and U.S. Sen. Kamala Harris, a Democratic candidate for President of the United States, in a spirit-





filled 11 a.m. worship service. Other dignitaries present at the service included N.C. Supreme Court Chief Justice Cheri Beasley, N.C. Sen. Erica Smith, a candidate for the U.S. Senate; Durham Mayor Steve Schewel and Durham Public Schools Superintendent Dr. Pascal Mubenga.



The 11 a.m. service recognized the Durham branch of the NAACP, the Durham chapter of the A. Philip Randolph Institute, the Durham and Chapel Hill graduate chapters of Alpha Kappa Alpha Sorority, Inc., and the Durham Alumni Chapter of Kappa Alpha Psi Fraternity, Inc., for their historic and ongoing contributions to furthering social justice in Durham and surrounding communities. But both the 8 a.m. and 11 a.m. services on Aug. 25 also took place against a backdrop of reminders that the fight for social justice in North Carolina and across the nation is far from over.

As referenced by St. Joseph's Senior Pastor, the Rev. Jonathan C. Augustine, in program notes, the week leading up to Aug. 25 marked the 400th anniversary of the arrival of enslaved Africans in North America, at Point Comfort, Virginia. Aug. 28, just a few days after the #SocialJustice Sunday services, was the 56th anniversary of the 1963 March on Washington—its full title being the March on Washington for Jobs and Freedom. And then, lest anyone forget, as alluded to by speakers including Sen. Harris, Rev. Augustine (also known as Pastor Jay), the Rev. James Lawson of the A. Philip Randolph Institute and Durham branch NAACP president the Rev. Rachel Green, there's today's fight for redemption and against injustice and inequality in high places.

In the title of his #SocialJusticeSunday sermon at the 8 and 11 a.m. services—and in the message itself—Pastor Jay raised this question: "And When Does the Church Get Political?" In exploring that topic, he shared and reflected upon some compelling answers. "History tells us that the church gets political when government does not respect the rights of people. The church gets political when the least of these need somebody to stand up for them," he said.

"Let me be clear. In response to the current bigotry, the current xenophobia and the current hatred that is emanating from 1600 Pennsylvania Avenue, it is time for the

church to get political," Pastor Jay said to applause from the congregation. As he continued his message, the pastor compared the situation of God's people today to the situation the prophet Jeremiah faced, covered in the Scripture that the pastor read to preface his sermon: Jeremiah 8:18-22.



"Jeremiah is trying to fix a system that was once prosperous, but things have been broken. He's trying to restore hope and build back up people's dreams, but they feel like their dreams are being drowned right before their eyes." In the scripture, "Jeremiah is calling on the people to get political by playing their part to fix their problems," Pastor Jay said. Jeremiah basically asks when we will get political, "by metaphorically asking when will we act to help ourselves."



Sen. Harris, who is from Oakland, California, and is the former Attorney General of her home state, sounded similar themes in remarks preceding Pastor Jay's sermon. As a young girl growing up in Oakland's 23rd Avenue Church of God, she learned that "one's faith and that my faith should be addressed as a verb. I was taught that when you want to praise God, then praise God through your actions, as well as your words."

In our fight for justice, "I believe Scripture sets the standard," Harris said, quoting from Proverbs 31 and referencing the Parable of the Good Samaritan. "Especially these days when we have so many powerful forces in our country, including the fel-

low in the White House who is trying to sow hate and division among us, these days that really do challenge our faith . . .when we think about the reading this morning and what it means to love thy neighbor, Jesus tells us how we should define neighbor," she said.

Your neighbor is not just the person next door or the person who drives the same kind of car that you do, she continued. "Jesus tells us your neighbor is that man by the side of the road who you walk by, who has faced hardship"--whether that is someone who has an opioid addiction, an immigrant who has sought refuge in the U.S., or a teacher who has to work three or four jobs to survive but "will not leave a profession that they are dedicated to..."

Scripture teaches us that when we fight for justice, "it is not only for our own justice, it is for justice for our neighbor," Harris said. ". . . And so let us rely on scripture these days when our faith is being tested and do it in a way that it propels us to act," she urged the congregation. "This election that we're about to hit will matter in profound ways. . . . "

After asking all in the congregation for their prayers, Sen. Harris' concluding words also resonated with the message that would follow from Pastor Jay: "There is so much good in the world and there is so much worth fighting for—and as we have often said and we know—the measure of our strength is not about who we beat down; it is about who we lift up. It is about who we lift up," she said. "So Lord, order our steps but let us know that in these steps that we take . . .we have the power borne of our faith to lift up, and to lift up not only our neighbor, but to lift up our country."



History of Poplar Springs African Methodist Episcopal Church

Poplar Springs A.M.E. Church purchased and organized its church circa 1880; the exact date is unknown. The land where the old church now stands was purchased in 1880 from Mr. & Mrs. Robert McSwain. On November 9, 1880, the Deed was executed before Justice of the Peace, Mr. William McLeod in Moore County. This Deed with the certificate was registered in the courthouse November 9, 1880. In February 1883, land for a cemetery was purchased from David and Nancy Oliver. The amount tendered by the Trustees for this purchase was ten (\$10.00) dollars. On November 24, 1885, the church was given the Certificate of Deed and was registered the same day in the County Courthouse by A. H. McNeill, Clerk of the Superior Court.

On February 21, 1906, C.H. Black and Dora Black of Moore County sold the property to the Lodge Knights of King David, Rosa Lodge No. 60 and Royal Knights of King David Pilgrim of Moore County, North Carolina, for the sum of Five (\$5.00) Dollars. The Deed was drawn up on December 26, 1906, and registered in Lee County Courthouse on February 11, 1918, by T.N. Campbell, Clerk of the Superior Court, and Ralph Monger, Register of Deeds. The Trustees of Poplar Springs A.M.E. Church also purchased land from the Board of Education of Lee County. The Deed was drawn up June 6, 1950, between the Trustees of the church and the Board of Education. The Trustees included Alton Tuck, W.D. McIver, C.C. Monroe, F.S. McLean, Charlie Taylor, Cleveland Taylor, and Thomas McDonald.

The first part cost Two Hundred (\$200.00) Dollars. This lot was known as the Poplar Springs Colored School Lot, adjoining Poplar Springs A.M.E. Church. Poplar Springs progressed from a brush arbor to a wood frame church with a potbelly stove and a dirt floor to a wood frame and wood floor. Today, we are blessed to have a beautiful edifice and "it doth not yet appear what we shall be" (1 John 3:2). There have been a many ministers, each of whom with the help of Almighty God helped to build Poplar Springs into the powerhouse it is today. We commend each of them for the contributions they made: Reverend Proctor, Reverend Worth, Reverend Stroud, Reverend Perry, Reverend H.D. Thomas, Rev-

erend Thompkins, Reverend Watson, Reverend Gantt, Reverend Williamson, Reverend J. C. Wright, Reverend Decker, Reverend Dillworth, Reverend A. M. Jones, Reverend Raines, Reverend S. L. Beard, Reverend T. M. Brown, Reverend J. R. Crutchfield and Reverend A.L. White, Reverend R. Goode, Reverend Christopher, Reverend Weaver, Reverend Irving, and Reverend Royal.



Poplar Springs History Continued...

Because the people had a mind to work, under the leadership of Reverend Goode a new building was completed and dedicated on August 10, 1975. Those participating in the service were Reverend J.N. Sheares, Presiding Elder of the Western North Carolina Conference; Reverend A.O. Carmichael; Reverend Bernard Wilder; Reverend James Ingram; Reverend J.R. Crutchfield; and Reverend W.E. Diggs. It was a great day in the life of our Church. The event can be summed up in the words, "We come this far by faith leaning on the Lord."

The first funeral held in the new building was Sister Mary Bell Smith (Aunt Maybell) who was a beautiful person and worked very hard, in both the church and the community. The first persons to become members in the new building were John Allen Newby and Michael Chesney. In June 1976, the church hosted the Sunday School Convention, and the District Sunday School Banner was awarded to Poplar Springs, while our representative, Miss Rosa Newby, was honored as the District Sunday School Queen.

The church continued to move forward during the pastorates of Reverend Weaver and Reverend Christopher. The community continued to support the ministries of the church and our presence was enhanced by their leadership. In May 1984, Reverend I.J. Irving was assigned to the church and under his leadership, the Lay Church was organized. Not one to rest on past accomplishments, in 1993, Reverend Irving along with the church membership decided to expand yet again. They started construction of a new church building which was completed in 1995. The building completed, in 1975, was converted into classrooms for Church School and a Fellowship Hall where the congregation could meet and greet, and even enjoy an occasional play. Reverend Irving presided over the first wedding in the new sanctuary on April 3, 1999, where he joined Mr. & Mrs. Rodney Boykin in holy matrimony. Under his guidance, the church continued to progress, installing signage, and paving the parking lot.

In May 2009, the membership welcomed Reverend Phyllis T. Royal. The church membership continued to increase and continued to be a vital part of the community. During her pastorate, the membership was able to completely pay off the mortgage on its property.

Our present Pastor, Reverend Dr. Saundra Bullock-Hunter, was assigned to our church in May 2011 and we continue to make progress. The membership embraced her vision and special services such as Advent, New Year's Eve, Holy Week-Maundy Thursday and Easter Sunrise were re-introduced and experienced. The Sons of Allen were organized with the older and younger men of the church; the Christian Education Department has been outstanding; the Young People's Department have been visible and active in the community with activities in local Group Homes; many ministries have been added; internal and external improvements have been made aesthetically and structurally; a Senior Ministry was started; the Music Ministry has expanded; and most importantly, souls have been saved and members have re-united to the body of Christ! We praise God for the Great Things He has done!

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
